


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AARP The Other Talk: A Guide To Talking With Your Adult Children About The Rest Of Your Life

Mother died of lung cancer after having Alzheimer's several years, cared for in multiple states in her 2 daughters' homes, hospitals, nursing home, & hospice. Mother's was a lengthy death with horrible mental confusion (a hard-on-her, harder-on-her daughters situation that she struggled against). If we'd had this book after Father died, we'd have known the important legal work we needed to have in place to handle taking over Mother's assets to use for her care if/when/WHEN she became incapacitated. Any angst that can be saved in these heartbreaking situations NEEDS to be saved. Read this book & don't get bogged down in how very thorough the author was with his own adult children. The last third or so is a resource guide.

This is an important book for just about anyone. It discusses the importance of talking about the last years of your life. It tells you what to organize and collect to help those left behind. You must have the discussion about what care you want and how you want items to be handled. Situations, for example, whether you should continue driving are discussed. It places heavy emphasis on the consequence of not discussing these issues. I recommend this book for parent and child alike. If you discuss this early, then you are prepared and the transition is easier. It is good for both parent and child to read this.

This book is a must read for...well....everyone. Because we're all going to age (unless we die young) and no matter what your situation, chances are that someone younger will need to help you. This is

a great conversation starter. As the author makes clear, it needs to be an ongoing conversation with your loved ones. And it doesn't have to be morbid and sad. Think of it as a gift to your children to share with them details that will make things easier for them when the time comes that you need assistance. This is one of the top five books I've discovered that has made a positive impact on my life.

I remember everyone being uncomfortable when my parents were ready to downsize and asked which things my brother and I wanted. Now I am the one who is downsizing and want to make it more comfortable for my children. Later on, there were a lot of questions I didn't ask my parents until they were too ill to answer them. Again, that is something I would like to do differently. Prosch's book isn't great literature, but it is clear and full of helpful suggestions. I bought one copy, read it, and bought copies for my children. Why? I thought my kids might be more comfortable talking with me about my aging and demise if they were forewarned. I also bought a copy for my brother. He's close to my age and also has children.

Although I thought there was a lot of repetition throughout, what he said got me not only thinking but acting. A family gathering was already scheduled when I read the review of the book and was encouraged by my daughter to purchase it. After our gathering, I bought a fire and water proof safe. My will, etc. was in the hands of my lawyer during this time and I now have up-dated papers.
