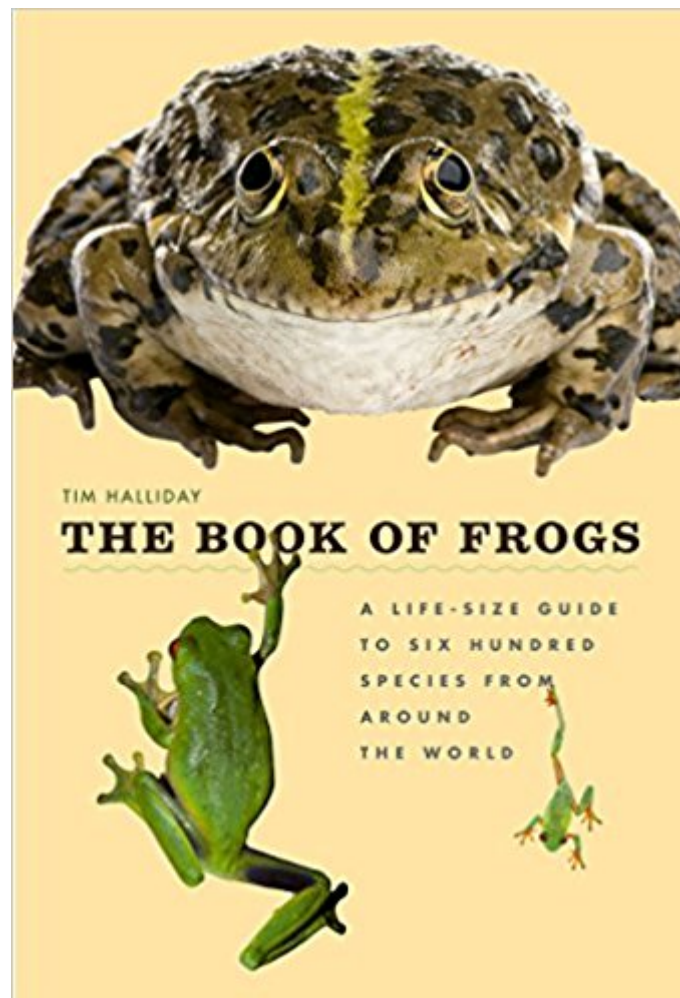




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# The Book Of Frogs: A Life-Size Guide To Six Hundred Species From Around The World

This is a whopper of a book, and could be used as a doorstop, it must weigh five or six pounds. It's an impressively printed book. It is not a guide to frogs worldwide, it's more of a sampler. Each page features one species, a brief description, a short paragraph of similar species, a small map, and a small grid with essential detail, including geographic range and conservation status (which uses the

IUCN status). Each page usually has two photos, one small and one life size (and the smallness of many is amazing, a literal thumbnail size on some). Some of the species are toads, and the author says here is no meaningful difference between frogs and toads. I don't know how other readers will approach this book. I read it from page 1 all the way through. Some readers might browse through and stop at an interesting looking frog, perhaps because of coloration, or stop at some interesting name. I don't know if I'd call this a coffee table book, it might break the table. It also might make a nice gift for some kids who have a fascination for frogs. It's not a happy frog book, though; many of the species listed are endangered or threatened, and the threats get depressing after a few dozen pages: harvesting for the pet trade, habitat loss due to illegal lumbering, forest clearance for agriculture, pesticide pollution, and particular the fungal disease chytridiomycosis, which is widespread and seems to have wiped out a number of species. A few have been victim of introduced trout that eat tadpoles. Every reader will find tidbits that are interesting. Here are some of mine from this wonderful book:--In 1986 there were 4,015 species of amphibians known to science; in 2015 there were 7,432, with new species discovered rather often.--Not all frogs hop. Some run and some walk (the book, alas, does not describe this. Can you imagine a Mark Twain story, "The Walking Frog of Calaveras County"?)--Not all frog eggs result in tadpoles. Some result in froglets.--A new frog has been described that is also a new genus, officially described in 2013, *Mercurana myristicapalustris*, named for the singer Freddie Mercury (native to India). Long after no one recalls his music, his name will appear with this species, mystifying future students.--Izecksohn's frog (Brazil) is unique, it eats whole fruits (I assume the fruit is small).--The Golden poison frog is, well, golden. There's enough poison in one frog's skin to kill 22,000 mice or 10 people. Which brings up the question, who did the research that says what kills 2,200 lab mice kills one person? Sounds like a natural plot for a comic murder mystery.--The European common frog emits "a loud piercing scream when attacked by a cat" which startles the cat which then drops the frog. I'd drop the frog, too.--The Western leopard toad eats snails, shell and all, (South Africa).--The Roraima bush toad when attacked by a tarantula tucks its legs and head into its body and like a pebble, rolls downslope (Guyana and near).--*Duellmanohyla salavida* is named after a Honduran beer.--The Pepper tree frog got its name because its skin secretion makes people sneeze (Central and South America).--The Tomato frog produces a defensive secretion that glues a snake's jaws together. (Madagascar). Does the frog escape or does it just make the snake more cautious next meal?--Some of the frogs are so ugly they're sort of cute. One is the Purple frog (India). Another is Lapham's warty frog (Tanzania).

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
